

Yale Wallops Brown In Second Half, 45-17

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Sept. 20 — Yale, the defending Ivy League champion, capitalized on an error-prone Brown team today and rolled to a 45-17 triumph before 13,500 fans in Brown Stadium. It was the fourth straight time that the Elis had downed the Bruins.

The top defensive team in the league the last eight seasons, Yale again excelled in that phase, recovering five Brown fumbles and intercepting one of Larry Carbone's passes.

"We've found a couple of weapons in Grieve and Diana," said Coach Carm Cozza of Yale, referring to Curtis Grieve and Rich Diana. "Still, it was a dogfight, not reflected by the final result."

Coach John Anderson, whose Bruins lost for the fifth time in eight games with a Cozza-coached team, said: "We played very, very poorly, and Yale played perfect football. Still, despite all of our mistakes, we were only 7 points down with most of the final quarter to play."

Six Elis scored, four on passes. Grieve, the split end, caught two scoring passes.

Grieve can propel his 6-foot-4-inch frame high into the air. On the 10-yard touchdown pass he caught from John Rogan in the opening period and the 15-yarder from Phil Manley in the second quarter, he made leaps that no ordinary defender could have thwarted.

Yale ran up a 19-6 halftime lead before the Bruins put together a sustained attack. Brown went 85 yards in 10 plays, Steve Curtin scoring on Carbone's 10-yard pass four seconds into the final period. Carbone ran for the 2-point conversion that cut Yale's margin to 24-14.

Then the Bruins picked up more momentum when Damon Finneran snared a Rogan pass at the Yale 42. Bud Brooks kicked a 31-yard field goal that made the score 24-17 with 9 minutes 19 seconds remaining.

Just as quickly, the momentum shifted back to Yale. Diana, the fullback, and Manley combined on a 54-yard pass-run play. Yale got the ball at its 47 on an interception by Dave Daugherty. On second down, Manley hit Diana near the right sideline at the 20. Diana wrested the ball away from Jeff Gradinger, the safety, and sped the final distance. Tony Jones booted the conversion, and the Elis had a 31-17 bulge.

That play took the heart out of the Bruins. Carbone fumbled on the first play after the kickoff, and Yale's tough middle guard, Kevin Czinger, recovered on the Brown 20. In five plays the Elis scored, Len Fasano driving the last 2 yards.

Yale recovered a fumble on the Brown 21 after the next kickoff, and a third-string quarterback, Joe Dufek, hit Dan Stratton with a 10-yard scoring pass on the sixth play.

Brown, besides losing five of its 10

fumbles, was penalized eight times for 73 yards, while Yale lost 51 yards on seven penalties.

Dartmouth 40, Penn 7

HANOVER, N.H., Sept. 20 (UPI) — Jeff Kemp's pinpoint passing sparked Dartmouth to a 30-point second period today, and the Big Green opened its 100th football season with a 40-7 victory over error-plagued Pennsylvania.

Penn went 83 yards for the first touchdown after stopping Dartmouth's opening march at the Quaker 17. Gib Carter passed 9 yards to Bruce Edwards for the score with 6:07 gone.

After that, it was all Dartmouth as the opportunistic Big Green converted two fumbles and capitalized on Quaker penalties. Kemp, connecting on 12 of 18 first-half passes and 17 of 25 for 195 yards over all, hit Mike Lemprez with a 3-yard scoring strike and rolled round left end on a 1-yard run for another score.

Cornell 17, Princeton 7

ITHACA, N.Y., Sept. 20 (AP) — Ben Tenuta and Tom Weidenkopf each scored a touchdown as Cornell took advantage of two Princeton fumbles today to defeat the Tigers, 17-7, before 12,000 fans at Schoellkopf Field.

Cornell took a 3-0 lead on a 42-yard field goal by Ron Rejda in the second quarter. Then, Mike Neary fumbled on first down at the Princeton 3. Dave Chalk recovered for Cornell, and Tenuta scored one play later from 6 yards out.

Princeton scored after a fumble recovery, gaining possession with 3:24 remaining in the first half at the Cornell 42. A pass-interference penalty moved the ball to the Big Red's 1, and Neary scored to draw Princeton within 10-7.

Cornell's second touchdown came as the result of a mishandled punt at the Tiger 26 with 11:14 remaining in the game. Four plays later, Weidenkopf scored on a 4-yard run.

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
