

Yale Holds Ivy Lead As Dartmouth Bows Elis Beat Penn

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 25 — Yale became the only undefeated team in the Ivy League today after struggling to an 8-0 victory over Pennsylvania at Franklin Field. With their third league victory, the Elis held first place alone.

"It was not one of our better performances over all," Yale's coach, Carm Cozza, said, "but we had some plus things. We gained yardage on the ground and we held them scoreless. It's a win and we're very happy about it."

Because of the rain-soaked artificial turf, Yale tried only 12 passes, completing four for 57 yards. Twenty-eight of those yards came on Rich Diana's lone reception, which set up the game's only touchdown midway through the first quarter.

Diana Is Outstanding

Diana, a junior from Hamden, Conn., was the busiest player for Yale, which raised its overall record to 5-1. He carried 27 times for 127 yards.

"It was pretty slippery out there," he said, "but I was able to keep my balance pretty well. We should have had more points, but Penn came at us pretty hard."

Diana went into the game ranked No. 1 in the nation as an all-purpose runner with an average of 191.6 yards in the first five contests.

With Yale operating from the I-formation, Diana's name was heard more times than anyone else's on the public-address system during the rain-chilled afternoon. He was involved in most of the Eli drives.

The first drive went 89 yards in eight plays, with Diana getting 54 yards. He caught Rogan's lone pass on that march, after which Rogan ran 26 yards for a touchdown.

It was Rogan's longest run of the season. The extra-point kick was blocked, but Penn was offside, which encouraged the Elis to try for 2 points instead of 1. Rogan made it with a rush.

Before a crowd of 6,823, held far below the average, despite Penn's homecoming, because of a torrential rain that preceded the kickoff, Diana had a couple of bad moments midway through the second quarter. On a half-back pass option, he threw a pass that was intercepted by Tony Liberatore. Liberatore returned 12 yards, but the Quakers ended up with fourth and 36

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and had to punt. Diana fumbled the punt.

Rogan regained the starting quarterback spot from Phil Manley, who started last week in the 30-10 victory over Columbia. Manley went in for a series shortly before intermission, but was unable to move the Elis.

Gary Vura, a sophomore from Miami, started his first game at quarterback for the Quakers, who operated out of the wishbone. Vura carried 15 times for only 12 yards in the first half and did not do much better in the second, as Penn showed an inefficient passing game.

The Quakers' regular quarterback, Doug Manzionie, who did not play, has completed only 14 of 40 passes for 114 yards and no touchdowns.

Penn did not do anything on attack, but performed well defensively for the second week in a row, yielding 281 total yards and making two interceptions.

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Cornell Victor

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ITHACA, N.Y. Oct. 25 — A week after moving into a first-place tie with Yale in the Ivy League, Dartmouth today slipped out of the top spot as it suffered its first league setback, a 7-3 loss to Cornell on the rain-soaked Schoelkopf field.

Bob Ryan, a senior quarterback, led Cornell to the only score it needed, directing a 74-yard first-quarter march and capping the drive with a 9-yard pass to Alva Taylor. The Cornell defense made the score stand up by holding Dartmouth to a 24-yard fourth-quarter field goal by Tim Geibel. Dartmouth, 2-1 in the league, is 2-4 over all, the same as Cornell, which stands 2-2 in Ivy competition.

The touchdown pass was only the second of three completions by Ryan in eight attempts on a cold, rainy, sloppy afternoon during which he threw two interceptions. He was more comfortable handing the ball off to his backs, a strategy which proved effective as Cornell gained 270 of its 333 yards rushing. Steve Vago, a senior tailback, led the attack with 84 yards on 25 carries and Dick Clasby, a senior fullback, collected 73 on 10 carries.

Kemp Intercepted

Jeff Kemp, the Ivy League's leading passer last season, completed 10 in 28 attempts for 147 yards, but he was intercepted three times, twice in the final period. He was thwarted by Dave Kimichik, a junior, and Ken Williams, a sophomore, who effectively covered his favorite receiver, Dave Shula.

Kemp, the son of Representative Jack Kemp of New York, a former quarterback with the Buffalo Bills, threw only four interceptions in Ivy League play last season and five in nine games. Today's performance gave him four Ivy League interceptions in just three games this season and eight interceptions over all.

Shula, the son of the Miami Dolphins head coach, Don, was the game's leading receiver in yardage with 58, although he caught only passes. He was shut out until the final five seconds of the first half, when he caught a 10-yarder, and the final minute of the second half, when he caught a 49-yard toss to put Dartmouth on the Cornell 24-yard line.

Stopping the Pass

Kimichik intercepted a pass for Cornell and broke up four others, and Williams broke up two fourth-quarter passes and picked up Cornell's second interception, in the fourth quarter.

Todd Flory, a senior safety, grabbed

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the third interception, picking off a pass by Kemp in the end zone to ice the game in the final 3 seconds.

Coach Bob Blackman of Cornell, who had a 14-2 won-lost record against Cornell when he coached at Dartmouth, is now 2-2 against the Big Green. The victory was the second straight by Cornell over Dartmouth, coached by Joe Yucca, a former Blackman assistant, who is now 1-2 against Cornell.

In six years as head coach at Dartmouth, Blackman won 79 league games and either won or tied for seven Ivy titles. He has not won an Ivy title yet at Cornell, but today's victory puts the Big Red in the running for this year's title. Dartmouth, which won its opener against Penn, now has lost four in a row.

Next week Cornell has a non-league game at Bucknell, and then faces Yale, Columbia and Penn, all league foes.

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
